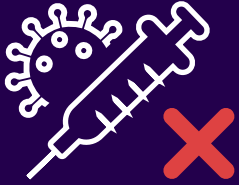


YOUR ANNUAL FLU SHOT IS MORE IMPORTANT THAN EVER

During the 2021–2022 FLU season, many people were left unprotected against FLU^a:

Your annual FLU shot helps protect you from FLU and its potentially severe outcomes. FLU can lead to:



Potentially life-threatening complications, including pneumonia and severe heart issues



Having to take time off work, which can impact income and productivity



Making preexisting conditions worse, including heart and lung disease



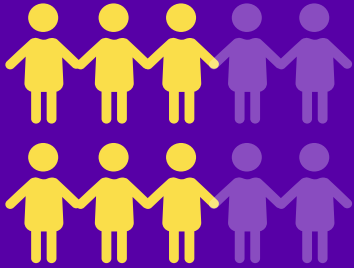
Infecting others, including those who may be more vulnerable

SCHEDULE YOUR FLU SHOT TODAY

RECEIVING BOTH A FLU VACCINE AND COVID-19 VACCINE IS ESSENTIAL:

While FLU and COVID-19 have some similar symptoms, they require different vaccines. If eligible, help protect yourself against both viruses by receiving each vaccine in a single visit.

Coinfection with FLU and COVID-19 can be dangerous



- In a study conducted during the 2020 COVID-19 pandemic, more than half of 307 adults aged 40+ were coinfecting with FLU and COVID-19.
- **The adults who had both influenza B and COVID-19 experienced increased risk of death and more severe outcomes.^a**

Frequently asked questions about receiving a FLU shot and COVID-19 vaccine together:

Can I receive my FLU shot and COVID-19 vaccine at the same time?

Yes, eligible patients can receive a FLU vaccine and a COVID-19 vaccine at the same time.

Even though both vaccines can be administered during the same visit, people should follow the recommended schedules for both vaccines.

Will my FLU shot and COVID-19 vaccine be less effective if they are given at the same time?

While limited data exist on giving COVID-19 vaccines with other vaccines, including FLU vaccines, experience with giving other vaccines together has shown the way our bodies develop protection and possible side effects are generally similar whether vaccines are given alone or with other vaccines.
